Nursing Program Updates:

- Kansas City KS Community College notified KSBN that effective 7/1/2023, Dr. Bronyal McFadden was named as Interim Director of Nursing Education for the college. Dr. McFadden is an experienced faculty member at KCKCC. On 8/2/23, a formal letter announced Dr. McFadden's had accepted a permanent appointment as the DONE.
- Newman University, BSN program, announced that on June 30, 2023, Teresa Vetter MSN, APRN-CNS would be retiring as Director of Nursing for the Newman BSN program and effective July 1, 2023, Ashton Clarkson, MSN, RN would be the new nursing program director.
- Flint Hills Technical College announced that effective July 31, 2023, Elveanna (Anna) Crabtree, MSN, RN will be the new Director of the Practical Nursing program at FHTC.
- Garden City Community College announced that after more than a decade of service to GCCC, Patsy Zeller, MSN, APRN, FNP has retired as the Director of Nursing. Effective 8/1/2023, Shellie Emahizer, MSN, RN has been named the Interim Director for the nursing program.

- Completed three KORA requests this quarter for NCLEX Candidate Performance Reports for potential petitioners

- Inquiries regarding Kansas regulations for nursing programs: continue to respond to requests from higher education entities or potential students regarding Kansas approval for out of state or online prelicensure undergraduate and advanced practice nursing programs. A requirement from the Department of Education has all schools with distance learning programs or hybrid programs researching requirements for all states from which they could accept students. A new data and information sheet for APRN education programs was placed on the website to help answer these types of questions.
- Other Activities:

- Attended a one-day virtual conference on *Chronic Disease Management* on June 8, 2023, presented through KU Area Health Education Center. Opening speaker gave an overview of the PERK Project done in rural Kansas. Also had speakers on epidemiology of chronic disease in KS, trauma-informed care, and lifestyle and chronic disease.
- Attended the 2023 Kansas Nurse Educator Conference held July 20-21, 2023, at Newman University in Wichita, KS.
- Researching reinstatement regulations and processes from other states to see how others are working to get nurses with inactive licenses back in the work force. Also looking at regulations and guidelines for NCLEX testing for initial licensing. Research to be presented to the Education Committee for discussion.
- Working on a more formal complaint process regarding nursing programs. There has been an increased incidence of complaints being reported to KSBN on Kansas nursing programs. Have drafted complaint forms, instruction sheet and currently working on an FAQ document to go with the process.
- Completed three NCSBN Survey requests from other boards of nursing. Topics were:
 - Nurse Consultants NV BON
 - Mandatory Clinical Hours KY BON
 - Directors of Education WA BON

MAJOR CURRICULUM CHANGE REQUEST

Documents attached:

- 1. Request to change from a three level program to a two level program
- 2. Rationale: The three level program included courses taught to all Mental Health Technicians in the orientation for Mental Health Technicians. As the orientation has changed it was deemed necessary to consolidate the program into two levels and to omit counting any classes taught in orientation of the MHT's. The faculty met and discussed this change and are in agreement of making the change. In addition, there is support from the Osawatomie State Hospital Administration. There will be no change in the theory taught nor in the clinical requirements. The new Level II program meets the requirement for 450 hours theory and 450 hours clinical while maintaining the integrity of the total MHT program. Minutes of the faculty meeting attached.
- 3. There will be changes in the hours for some courses. Attached is the comparison with the previous curriculum to the requested curriculum.
- 4. Attached is the comparison of the previous course descriptions to the requested course descriptions.
- 5. There is no change to the number of students to be admitted to the program. The faculty have discussed and determined that an ideal enrollment would be 4 students and not to exceed 8 students. This will ensure that the 1:10 clinical ratio will be maintained. While there is not a regular time assigned for a clinical experience, the overall course schedule is designed to incorporate clinical and theory hours throughout the program. Community clinical experiences are shown with the clinical hours assigned.
- 6. The Osawatomie State Hospital has the resources to meet the needs of the program. There is a designated library, AV materials and equipment, a designated laboratory, and faculty includes 2 RN's and an LMHT assigned as instructors and the instructors for the Behavioral Science course meet the required standard. The Administration is supportive of the program as indicated in the last KSBN site visit. The 5 year approval of the program was granted with 2 recommendations to be met prior to admission of students.

Course Descriptions

Mental Health Technician Program

<u>LEVEL I</u>

Technical Health Skills I - Introduction to Nursing: This course serves as an introduction to nursing skills with emphasis on basic concepts of health maintenance and promotion. It provides skill development in utilizing comfort and protection measures such as bed making, personal hygiene, ADL's, infection prevention, and vital signs. Basic principles of nutrition, hydration, and elimination are emphasized. The role in emergency procedures such as fire and disaster, CPR, First Aid, and assisting with bringing emergency oxygen and suctioning equipment are emphasized. Supervised practicum assists the learner in acquiring and integrating the basic health concepts.

<u>Understanding Mental Illness</u>: This course is an introduction to the concepts of mental health and mental illness. Focus will be on the causes, symptoms, and treatment of mental illness. An overview of diagnostic criteria of the major mental illnesses will be presented. The role of resilience in the prevention of and recovery from mental illness will be explored as well as individual stress response. Basic observation skills, communication skills, and reporting responsibilities for the mental health technician will be explored.

Psychiatric Intervention 1: This course introduces the learner to the basic concepts of psych/mental health and the learner's role in working with clients in the mental health setting. Principles of basic communication and coping skills are emphasized. Emphasis on safety measures in working with clients in the mental health setting is stressed as are interventions to help the learner in his/her role are included.

<u>Practicum</u>: Supervised clinical instruction in applying the concepts learned in the courses outlined above. The practicum includes rotation to various treatment programs during this level.

<u>LEVEL II</u>

Technical Health Skills II: This course serves to provide and reinforce the technical nursing skills essential for the role of the MHT. Infection control and safety are emphasized. Documentation is emphasized. Focus is placed on the nursing care of individuals with special needs.

<u>Mental Health Concepts</u>: This course will review the principles and concepts of mental health, psychopathology, and treatment modalities related to the care of patients. Emphasis will be on the individual as a social being and principles of basic communication, therapeutic interaction, and group process. Rights of the hospitalized patient will be explored as well as the process of admission, inpatient treatment, and discharge. Ethical standards and decision making skills for the mental health technician will be discussed.

Psychiatric Intervention II: Emphasizes the exploration of deviations of mental and social health, correlations of signs and symptoms of clinical syndromes, integration of mental disorders with

OLD 3 pages therapeutic nursing principles, treatment, and rehabilitation interventions. Focus is placed on perfecting therapeutic communication skills.

Human Growth & Development: This course is designed to provide an overview of life span development from infancy through old age. Childhood, adolescent, and adult development will be explored through this study of major theories. Emphasis will be placed on the psychological, biological, and sociological development of the individual. Factors influencing changes that occur during each life stage will be presented. The role of the family as it related to health and wellness and its role in growth and development will also be explored.

<u>Practicum</u>: Supervised clinical instruction of previously acquired skills and focus on further building of technical skills. Emphasis placed on the role in working with individuals who are diagnosed with psychiatric disorders. Focus on the MHT role in the management/care of individuals who happen to be developmentally delayed. The practicum includes rotation through each hospital program and community-based experience.

<u>LEVEL III</u>

Technical Health Skills III: This course continues to build on the previously acquired skills learned with emphasis on learning new skills essential for the advanced role. Skills taught include: Care of intravenous infusion therapy, ostomy care, catheterization-care, oxygen and suctioning, and continued emphasis on infection prevention. Emphasis is placed on the learning the standards for this role.

Human Body in Health & Illness: This course presents knowledge of normal body structures, their basic functions, and the interrelationships between the body systems during health and illness. This course explores the deviations of physical heath and correlates signs and symptoms of illness with specific treatment and nursing interventions.

Pharmacology & Drug Administration: Pharmacology and drug administration focuses on the basic concepts of drug administration and the pharmacological effects of drugs. Action, use, dosage ranges, routes of administration, side effects, contraindications, and nursing implications are emphasized. Skills necessary for safe and accurate drug administration are taught. The administrations of medication via the oral, inhalation, topical, nasal instillation, and vaginal insertion roles are taught. In addition, the administration of medications via eye, ear instillation and rectal insertion are learned. Principles and skills in the intramuscular, subcutaneous, and intradermal injections will be learned. Specific pharmacological agents will be correlated with conditions discussed in the courses Human Body in Health and Illness and Psychiatric Intervention I and II.

Psychiatric Intervention III: This course emphasizes the continued exploration and development of skills taught in Psychiatric Intervention I and II. Emphasis is placed on the learner's ability to recognize, intervene, and report the person's response to medication (i.e. effectiveness, side effects, etc.) Providing basic medication education is stressed.

Behavioral Science: This course emphasizes the role of social, economic, and cultural factors in the development of mental illness. Focus on group and family dynamics and their relationship to

mental illness and their role in treatment and rehabilitation is discussed. The effects of serious and persistent mental illness on daily functioning, interpersonal relationships, and quality of life will be addressed.

Practicum: Supervised clinical instruction of previously acquired technical skills demonstrating knowledge and performance of simple nursing principles, safe drug administration, and displaying an understanding of the complexity of his/her role in relation to both mental and physical illness, treatment and rehabilitation. The role of the learner in providing education is stressed. The practicum includes rotation through each hospital program and community-based experiences in preventive and acute care settings.

Course Descriptions

MENTAL HEALTH TECHNICIAN PROGRAM

LEVEL I

<u>Technical Health Skills 1:</u> This course includes an introduction to nursing skills with emphasis on basic concepts of health maintenance and promotion. Skill development in utilizing comfort and protection measure such as bed making, personal hygiene, ADL's, infection prevention and vital signs are included. The technical skills essential for the role of an MHT (MHDDT) are emphasized. Documentation is an important component of this level. Focus will be on working with individuals with special needs.

<u>Mental Health Concepts</u>: This course will review the principles and concept of mental health, psychopathology, and treatment modalities related to the care of patients. Emphasis will be on the individual as a social being and principles of basic communication, therapeutic intervention, and group process. Rights of the hospitalized patients will be explored as well as the process of admission, inpatient treatment, and discharge. Ethical standards and decision making skills for the Mental Health Technician (MHDDT) will be discussed.

<u>Psychiatric Intervention 1</u>: This course will incorporate the basic concepts of psych/mental health and the care and treatment of individuals in the mental health setting. Included will be concepts of basic communication while building on the student's ability to utilize therapeutic communication techniques. Emphasis is placed on the exploration of mental and social health, correlations of signs and symptoms of clinical syndromes, integration of mental disorders with the therapeutic nursing principles, treatment and rehabilitation interventions.

<u>Practicum:</u> Supervised clinical instruction of previously acquired skills and focus on building of technical skills, communication skills, and knowledge of psych/mental health conditions. Included is the role of the MHT (MHDDT) in the management/care of individuals who happen to be developmentally delayed. The Practicum includes rotation through each hospital program and community based experience.

LEVEL II

<u>Human Growth and Development</u>: This course is designed to provide an overview of life span development from infancy through old age. Childhood, adolescent, and adult development will be explored through the study of major theories. Emphasis will be placed on the psychological, biological, and sociological development of the individual. Factors influencing changes that occur during each life stage will be presented. The role of family as it relates to health and wellness and its role in growth and development will be explored.

<u>Technical Health Skills II</u>: This course serves to build on previously acquired skills learned with emphasis on learning new skills essential for the advanced role. Skills taught include: Care for the client with intravenous s infusion therapy, catherization care, oxygen, and continued emphasis on infection prevention. Emphasis is placed on learning the standards for this role.

<u>Human Body in Health and Illness</u>: This course presents knowledge of normal body structures, their basic functions and the interrelationships between body systems during health and illness. This course explores the deviations of physical health and correlates signs and symptoms of illness with specific treatment and nursing interventions.

<u>Pharmacology and Drug Administration</u>: Pharmacology and drug administration focuses on the basic concepts of drug administration and the pharmacological effects of drugs. Action, use, dosage ranges, routes of administration, side effects, contraindications and nursing interventions are emphasized. Skills necessary for safe and accurate drug administration are taught. The administration of medication via the oral, inhalation, topical, nasal instillation and vaginal insertion routes are taught. In addition, the administration of medications via eye, ear and rectal insertion are learned. Principles and skills in the intramuscular, subcutaneous and information on intradermal injections will be taught. Specific pharmacological agents will be correlated with conditions discussed in Human Body and Health and Illness and Psychiatric Intervention courses.

<u>Psychiatric Intervention II:</u> This course emphasizes the continued exploration and development of skills taught in Psychiatric Intervention 1. Emphasis is placed on the learner's ability to recognize, intervene, and report the person's response to medication (effectiveness, side effects, etc.) and the nursing care/treatment. Opportunities for growth in communication skills are provided. Providing medication education is stressed. Focus will be on the development and implementation of a health education topic.

<u>Behavioral Science</u>: This course emphasizes the role of social, economic, and cultural factors in the development of mental illness. Focus on group and family dynamics and their relationship to mental illness and their role in treatment and rehabilitation is discussed. The effects of serious and persistent mental illness on daily functioning, interpersonal relationships, and quality of life will be addressed.

<u>Practicum</u>: Supervised clinical instruction of previously acquired technical skills demonstrating knowledge and performance of simple nursing principles, safe drug administration, and displaying an understanding of the complexity of his/her role in relation to both mental and physical illness, their treatment and rehabilitation. The role of the learner in providing education is stressed. The practicum includes rotation through each hospital program and community-based experiences in preventive and acute care settings.

Changes approved by KSBN:

Mission statement (approved June 29. 2022)

Revised philosophy (approved June 28, 2022)

Pre-nursing courses: (required starting for students entering the nursing program fall 2025/entering BC fall 2023, approved by KSBN March 21, 2023)

1. New course NURS-1100, Introduction to Professional Nursing, pre-nursing class, prerequisite starting for students starting the nursing program in fall 2025. This course provides observational experience for pre-nursing students and allows pre-nursing students to take a nursing course as a freshman (currently the first nursing course is in the fall semester junior year).

- 2. Remove current course NURS-3000, Introduction to the Healthcare Environment

This course will focus on the wellness/disease prevention sphere found in the AACN New Essentials (2021)
- Remove NURS-3300, Pharmacology I (first semester of nursing program) and NURS-3640, Pharmacology II (second semester of nursing program). Create new course NURS-3350, Pharmacology to combine this content in the first semester of the nursing program
- 8. Change in course description, course objectives and name for proposed course NURS-3400, Nursing Care of Adults I. This course will have a focus on chronic health as described in the AACN New Essentials (2021)
- 9. Change in course description, course objectives and name for proposed course NURS-3410, Nursing Care of Adults I: Clinical. This course will have a focus on chronic health as described in the AACN New Essentials (2021)
- 10. Remove NURS-3500, Maternal/Child Nursing. Proposed separation of this course into two new courses: NURS-3520, Pediatric Care and NURS-3530 Maternal/Newborn Care
- Remove NURS-3510, Maternal/Child Nursing Clinical and NURS-4310, Mental Health Nursing: Clinical. Proposed combination of these courses into one new course NURS-3710, Specialty Nursing: Clinical

- 6. Minor curriculum changes in course descriptions and objectives for all other senior level courses and NURS-1100, Introduction to Professional Nursing which is a pre-nursing requirement (approved by Janelle Martin on August 7, 2023). Some of these courses had title changes.

Rationale for change:

These new courses have been developed as part of the revision of the entire nursing curriculum. These changes are based on the New Essentials from American Association of Colleges of Nursing (AACN); the New Essentials (2021) provide a framework for nursing education. These changes are also reflective of changes in professional nursing. The School of Nursing Mission Statement, Philosophy, Overall Curriculum Plan, End of Program Student Learning Outcomes. Level Outcomes have been revised. Each course in the School of Nursing has been revised to reflect these changes.

Faculty involvement in process:

The nursing faculty have been very involved in the process and have provided significant input into the curriculum revision process. Discussions of the curriculum revisions started at our summer retreat in June 2021. All minor and major curriculum changes submitted to KSBN were first approved by the nursing faculty.

Changes in resources:

The total number of required nursing credit hours will increase by one credit hour to 57 hours.

The total clinical hours will increase by 28.5 hours. Six new hours will be observational in NURS-1100, Introduction to Professional Nursing. Forty-five new hours will be precepted in NURS-4910, Capstone Clinical. We added a new full-time position of simulation coordinator in the fall of 2023.

We will be adding a new clinical rotation in the third semester. We plan to use local rural hospitals as clinical partners; we have had clinicals in the past at these locations. We will hire adjunct clinical instructors if needed.

There are no significant changes in resources. The library, AV materials and equipment, laboratory, faculty, and support services are adequate for this change.

Benedictine College School of Nursing Major Curriculum Change Request Creation of New course **Title:** NURS-4100, Nursing Care of Adults II

Rational: The School of Nursing is in the process of revising the entire nursing curriculum. These changes are based on the New Essentials from American Association of Colleges of Nursing (AACN); the New Essentials (2021) provide a framework for nursing education. These changes are also reflective of changes in professional nursing.

Course Description: The nursing care of adult clients with acute and complex illnesses is the focus of this course. Clinical judgment skills needed to provide regenerative and restorative nursing care for these clients will be emphasized. Concepts of intracranial regulation, perfusion, clotting, and acid-base balance will be included.

Course Objectives:

- 1. Apply leadership principles to communicate, collaborate, and delegate within interprofessional teams.
- 2. Demonstrate professional and ethical behavior as a member of the healthcare team.
- 3. Formulate holistic care when devising patient-centered interventions.
- 4. Develop self-confidence, professional image, and sense of belonging that facilitate the effective transition to practice.
- 5. Develop increasing autonomy to manage an assignment that closely approximates a realistic workload of the novice nurse in that environment.
- 6. Design a plan of care using professional nursing and leadership principles.

Title: NURS-4910, Capstone: Clinical

Change: Revision of existing course. Increase credit hours from 2 credit hours to 3 credit hours, revision of course description and course objectives.

Rational: We want to increase the credit hours to be consistent throughout the School of Nursing. We increased the clinical hours from 90 to 135 hours in spring 2023 based on feedback from several stakeholder groups (students, graduates, employers, clinical partners, faculty, other Schools of Nursing).

Course Description: This precepted capstone clinical course prepares the student for the professional nursing role and assists in the transition to nursing practice by providing students with the opportunity to synthesize knowledge, concepts, and skills learned in previous courses. Students will use critical thinking skills and evidence-based practice to promote person-centered nursing. Emphasis is placed on the role of the nurse to deliver ethical; holistic; compassionate; and safe and effective nursing care.

Course Objectives:

- 1. Apply leadership principles to communicate, collaborate, and delegate within interprofessional teams.
- 2. Demonstrate professional and ethical behavior as a member of the healthcare team.
- 3. Formulate holistic care when devising patient-centered interventions.
- 4. Develop self-confidence, professional image, and sense of belonging that facilitate the effective transition to practice.
- 5. Develop increasing autonomy to manage an assignment that closely approximates a realistic workload of the novice nurse in that environment.
- 6. Design a plan of care using professional nursing and leadership principles.






1. Is the program nationally nursing accredited?





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KSBN Regulation Review Process

As per K.S.A. 77-440, as amended in 2022, state agencies are required to submit a report regarding an intensive review of their regulations every five years. In the past we have reviewed each regulation on a five-year schedule, however that review did not contain all the information that must be completed by the Board for this intensive review. <u>The report from KSBN must be</u> <u>submitted by July 15, 2025.</u> There are 90 regulations in the Kansas Nurse Practice Act that must have the intensive review completed by that date. These regulations have been assigned to the appropriate committees to conduct the intensive review. There will be some regulations to review at each committee meeting and the committee members should come prepared for this review. The regulation will be placed in the committee packet. A copy of the KSBN Regulation Review Form will also be placed in the committee packet for each of the regulations listed on the agenda for review. Agency staff will complete Part 1 that includes information about the history of the regulation. <u>The rest of the questions on the form must be answered by the committee</u> **members.** Committee members need to answer the following questions:

- Necessity (2 questions):
 - Is the rule and regulation necessary for the implementation and administration of state law?
 - Does the rule and regulation serve an identifiable public purpose in support of state law?
- **Potential for revocation** (taking the regulation off the active list of regulations and no longer be utilized):
 - Briefly describe how revocation would affect Kansans (max 800 characters)
 - Is the rule and regulation being revoked?
 - If the rule and regulation is not in active use, would revocation require a change to the authorizing or implementing statute?
 - If the rule and regulation is not in active use and revocation would require a change in the authorizing or implementing statute, which changes? (maximum 400 characters)
- Additional information: additional information necessary to understanding the necessity of the rule and regulation (maximum 1,200 characters)

It is imperative each committee member review the regulation and the review form and come to the committee meeting prepared to discuss their answers. The committee will decide the final answers that should be submitted for each regulation. If the committee needs to table until the next meeting in which more discussion needs to occur, please realize <u>all the regulation review</u> <u>must be completed no later than the June 2025 committee meetings.</u>

Article 1.--Approval of Schools of Nursing

Printable Format

60-1-102. Approval procedure. Each institution wanting to establish a nursing program shall meet the following requirements:

(a) Notify the board and provide any information that the board requires to establish satisfactory proof that the institution will maintain the standards and curriculum of an approved nursing program;

(b) submit the name and qualifications of the nursing program administrator for approval by the board;

(c) employ a qualified nursing program administrator;

(d) employ a second faculty member;

(e) have financial resources for faculty, other necessary personnel, equipment, supplies, counseling, and other services;

(f) have adequate clinical and educational facilities to meet student learning outcomes;

(g) provide general education courses required for admission to the nursing program;

(h) submit an application with a detailed proposed three-year budget, curriculum plan, list of prospective faculty, organizational chart, organizing curricular framework, program outcomes, student and faculty policies, program evaluation plan, and contractual agreements for clinical facilities at least six months before enrollment of students; and

(i) be approved before the admission of any students.

This regulation shall be effective on and after January 1, 2022. (Authorized by K.S.A. 65-1129; implementing K.S.A. 65-1119; effective Jan. 1, 1966; amended Jan. 1, 1973; amended, E-74-29, July 1, 1974; modified, L. 1975, ch. 302, § 1, May 1, 1975; amended April 26, 1993; amended Jan. 1, 2022.)

Article 1.--Approval of Schools of Nursing

60-1-103. Discontinuing a school of nursing. Each school terminating its program shall submit for approval to the board the school's plan for its currently enrolled students and the school's plan for disposition of records. (Authorized by K.S.A. 65-1129; implementing K.S.A. 65-1119; effective Jan. 1, 1966; amended, E-74-29, July 1, 1974; amended May 1, 1975; amended April 26, 1993; amended Nov. 7, 2008.)

Printable Format

60-1-104. Definitions. Each of the following terms, as used in the board's regulations except articles 5, 6 and 17, shall have the meaning specified in this regulation:

(a) "Affiliating agency" means an agency that cooperates with the nursing program to provide facilities and clinical resources for selected student experiences.

(b) "Approval" means the status granted by the board to a nursing program that provides evidence of both of the following:

(1) The nursing program is operating on a sound educational basis that is consistent with the educational requirements as specified in the nurse practice act and the board's regulations.

(2) The nursing program has no deficiencies that would adversely affect student learning outcomes.

(c) "Articulation" means the process by which a registered professional nurse, licensed practical nurse, or mental health technician who is enrolled in a nursing program is given credit for previous education in nursing or mental health technology.

(d) "Bilevel program" means a nursing program that has one application process, with faculty teaching practical nurse (PN) and registered nurse (RN) content from the first day of the nursing program. The student can opt out of the RN program, which is known as the PN exit option, take the national council license examination-practical nursing (NCLEX-PN), and become licensed as a PN; or the student can matriculate through the entire nursing program, take the national council license examination-registered nurse (NCLEX-RN), and become licensed as a RN.

(e) "Capstone course" means an experiential nursing course for students to demonstrate integration of knowledge and professional nursing supervised by a preceptor during the final semester of the professional nursing program.

(f) "Clinical learning experience" means an active process in which the student participates in nursing activities while being guided by a member of the faculty.

(g) "Clinical observational experience" means the process in which the student views health care interventions but does not participate in the interventions. Affiliating agency personnel shall be responsible for patient care. However, a student may use any of the five senses while with the patient for the sole purpose of observing as the agency professional assesses and provides care to the patient. The instructor shall not be required to be present, but the students shall be included in the faculty-student ratio.

(h) "Community-based health care" means health care provided outside of hospitals and long-term care facilities, including public health departments, ambulatory health clinics, prenatal and well-baby clinics, hospice agencies, doctors' offices, industrial settings, homeless shelters, nursing centers, home health agencies, and patients' homes.

(i) "Conditional approval" means the status that the board imposes on an approved nursing program for a limited time to comply after finding evidence that the nursing program no longer meets educational requirements as specified in the nurse practice act or the board's regulations. When placed on conditional approval, the nursing program may be directed by the board to limit or cease admissions.

(j) "Contractual agreement" means a written contract signed by the legal representatives for the nursing program and the affiliating agency.

(k) "Criteria for unscheduled survey" means indications that the nursing program no longer meets the requirements in the nurse practice act or the board's regulations.

(I) "Debriefing" means an activity that follows a simulation experience and is led by a facilitator. Participants' reflective thinking is encouraged and feedback is provided regarding the participants' performance while various aspects of the completed simulation are discussed. Participants are encouraged to explore emotions and question, reflect, and provide feedback to one another in order to facilitate the transfer of learning to future situations.

(m) "Faculty degree plan" means the plan for a course of study leading to a degree appropriate for a teaching position.

(n) "Faculty hire exception" means that a nursing program is allowed by the board to hire, on a limited-time basis and in accordance with K.A.R. 60-2-103, an instructor who does not meet the faculty qualifications if no qualified individuals are available.

(o) "Generic student" means one who enters at the beginning of a prelicensure nursing program and plans to complete the entire curriculum.

(p) "Initial approval" means the approval period from the first admission of nursing students to the nursing program through the first full implementation of the curriculum and graduation.

(q) "Loss of approval" means the status that results when the board withdraws its approval of a nursing program.

(r) "National nursing accreditation agency" means the accreditation commission for education in nursing, the commission for nursing education accreditation, or the commission on collegiate nursing education.

(s) "Nursing program administrator" means an individual with successful experience in administration or teaching and with a graduate degree in nursing. However, an individual with successful experience in administration or teaching whose graduate degree is not in nursing and was conferred on or before July 1, 1999 shall be acceptable. This individual has the primary responsibility and Editoria 161

time for effective and continuous oversight of a nursing program, including the following:

(1) Verification that the nursing program complies with the nursing act and the board's regulations;

(2) assurance that nursing program and educational outcomes are met;

(3) assessment of and recommendations for material, human, and clinical resources for effective nursing program implementation;

(4) collaboration with faculty for continuous nursing program improvement; and

(5) responsibility for the development and implementation of the nursing program.

(t) "Nursing program" means practical nursing program or professional nursing program, or both.

(u) "One-plus-one program" means a nursing program that includes two application processes, one for the practical nurse (PN) program and one for the registered nurse (RN) program. The first level has only PN content, and the student must obtain a PN license before continuing in the RN program.

(v) "Online or distance learning" means the acquisition of knowledge and skills through information and instruction provided by means of a variety of technologies.

(w) "PN exit option" means in the bilevel programs that there is one application process for the PN and RN programs. Therefore, a PN exit option allows students to opt out of the RN program at a designated point in the curriculum. At this point, these students apply for licensure and take the NCLEX-PN.

(x) "Practical nursing program" means a course of study leading to a certificate and preparing an individual for licensure as a practical nurse.

(y) "Preceptor" means a registered professional nurse supervising a student in the clinical setting who is not employed as nursing faculty. The preceptor provides oversight of each student's patients and gives feedback to the student and clinical instructor. The nursing program faculty shall not be required to be in the affiliating agency's facilities but shall be immediately available.

(z) "Professional nursing program" means a course of study preparing an individual for licensure as a registered professional nurse. This term shall include baccalaureate degree programs and associate degree programs.

(1) A "baccalaureate degree program" shall lead to a baccalaureate degree with a major in nursing.

(2) An "associate degree program" shall lead to an associate of science or applied science degree, each with a major in nursing.

(aa) "Program evaluation plan" means a nursing program's written systematic methodology or plan for measuring and analyzing student learning outcomes and program outcomes against defined standards and timelines to determine effectiveness and provide for ongoing nursing program improvement.

(bb) "Refresher course" means an educational program for nurses whose licenses are inactive or have lapsed for more than five years.

(cc) "Review course" means an education offering used to prepare students for the licensing examination.

(dd) "Satellite program" means an existing, approved nursing program that is offered at a location geographically separate from the parent nursing program. The students may spend a portion or all of their time at the satellite location. The curricula in all locations shall be the same, and the credential shall be given by the parent institution.

(ee) A "school of nursing" means a nursing program. This term may include any of the following:

(1) A college;

(2) a school;

- (3) a division;
- (4) a department;
- (5) an academic unit; or
- (6) a program.

(ff) "Simulation" means a teaching strategy utilizing technology to replace or amplify clinical situations with guided experiences that evoke or replicate substantial aspects of the real world in a fully interactive manner.

(gg) "Survey or site visit" means an in-person assessment of all components of a nursing program to validate information submitted by the nursing program or to follow up on the board's determination that there is consistent evidence reflecting deficiencies in meeting the requirements.

(hh) "Student learning outcomes" means the achievement of expected knowledge, skills, and attributes demonstrated by students at course and program levels. Student learning outcomes are measured in classroom and experiential settings and are reported in Education 162 individual and aggregate formats, including retention and graduation rates, performance on licensure and certification examinations, and

employment rates.

(ii) "Transfer student" means one who is permitted to apply nursing courses completed at another institution to a nursing program of study.

APRN Draft Regs

60-17-101. Definitions. Each of the following terms, as used in this article of the board's regulations, shall have the meaning specified in this regulation:

(a) An "advanced nursing education program" may be housed within a part of any of the following organizational units within an academic institution:

(1) A college;

(2) a school;

(3) a division;

(4) a department; or

(5) an academic unit.

(b) <u>"Academic equivalent" means the proportionate credit for formal academic coursework if that</u> coursework is completed on the basis of trimester or quarter credit hours rather than semester credit hours.

(c) "Affiliating agency" means an agency that cooperates with the advanced nursing education program to provide elinical facilities and resources for selected student experiences.

(c) (d) "Clinical learning <u>experience</u>" means an active process in which the student participates in advanced nursing activities while being guided by a member of the faculty.

(d) (e) "Contractual agreement" means a written contract or letter signed by the legal representatives of the advanced nursing education program and the affiliating agency.

(e) "Preceptor" means an advanced practice registered nurse or a physician who provides clinical supervision for advanced practice registered nurse students as a part of nursing courses taken during the advanced nursing education program.

(f) "Satellite program" means an existing, accredited advanced nursing education program provided at a location geographically separate from the parent program. The students may spend a portion or all of their time at the satellite location. The curricula in all locations shall be the same, and each credential shall be conferred by the parent institution.

(f) "Criteria for unscheduled survey or site visit" means indications that the advanced nursing program no longer meets the requirements in the nurse practice act or the board's regulations.

(g) "Debriefing" means an activity that follows a simulation experience and is led by a facilitator. Participants' reflective thinking is encouraged and feedback is provided regarding the participants' performance while various aspects of the completed simulation are discussed. Participants are encouraged to explore emotions and question, reflect, and provide feedback to one another in order to facilitate the transfer of learning to future situations.

(h) "Loss of approval" means the status that results when the board withdraws its approval of an advanced nursing program.

(i) "Online or distance learning" means the acquisition of knowledge and skills through information and instruction provided by means of a variety of technologies.

(i) "Practice hour" means 60 minutes allotted for clinical learning.

(k) "Preceptor" means an advanced practice registered nurse or a physician supervising a student in the clinical setting who is not employed as nursing faculty. The preceptor provides oversight of each student's patients and gives feedback to the student and clinical instructor. The nursing program faculty shall not be required to be in the affiliating agency's facilities but shall be immediately available.

(1) "Program evaluation plan" means an advanced nursing program's written systematic methodology or plan for measuring and analyzing student learning outcomes and program outcomes against defined standards and timelines to determine effectiveness and provide for ongoing program improvement.

(m) "Satellite program" means an existing, approved advanced nursing program that is offered at a location geographically separate from the parent advanced nursing program. The students may spend a portion or all of their time at the satellite location. The curricula in all locations shall be the same, and each credential shall be conferred by the parent institution.

(n) "Semester credit hours" means at least 13 clock-hours of formal, didactic classroom instruction that occurred over the course of an academic semester and for which the applicant received formal academic credit.

(o) "Simulation" means a teaching strategy utilizing technology to replace or amplify clinical situations with guided experiences that evoke or replicate substantial aspects of the real world in a fully interactive manner.

(p) "Survey or site visit" means an in-person assessment of all components of an advanced nursing program to validate information submitted by the advanced nursing program or to follow up on the board's determination that there is consistent evidence reflecting deficiencies in meeting the requirements.

(q) "Student learning outcomes" means the achievement of expected knowledge, skills, and attributes demonstrated by students at course and program levels. Student learning outcomes are measured in classroom and experiential settings and are reported in individual and aggregate formats, including retention and graduation rates, performance on certification examinations, and employment rates.

(g) (r) "Transfer student" means an individual who is permitted to apply advanced nursing courses completed at another institution to a different advanced nursing education program.

(s) "Quarter credit hour" means two-thirds of a semester credit hour. Quarter credit hours shall be rounded as follows:

(1) One quarter credit hour equals .7 semester hours.

(2) Two quarter credit hours equals 1.3 semester hours.

(3) Three quarter credit hours equals 2.0 semester hours.

(4) Four quarter credit hours equals 2.7 semester hours.

(5) Five quarter credit hours equals 3.3 semester hours. (Authorized by K.S.A. 65-1129 and K.S.A. 2010 2017 Supp. 74-1106; implementing K.S.A. 2017 Supp. 65-1133, as amended by L. 2011, ch. 114, sec. 47; effective March 31, 2000; amended May 18, 2012; amended P-_____.) **60-17-102.** Requirements for initial approval. (a) Each hospital and agency serving as an affiliating agency and providing facilities for clinical experience shall be licensed or accredited by the appropriate credentialing groups. Administration and organization.

(b)(1) The Each advanced nursing education program or the institution of which it is a part shall be a legally constituted body. The controlling body shall be responsible for general policy and shall provide the financial support for the advanced nursing education program.

(2) Authority and responsibility for administering the advanced nursing education program shall be vested in the <u>dedicated</u> nurse administrator of the advanced nursing education program who has sufficient administrative time and support to achieve and maintain positive program/student outcomes.

(3) The advanced nursing program shall be accredited, be part of an institution that is accredited, or be in the process of being accredited by an agency that is approved by the United States department of education.

(c) <u>Application</u>. Each new proposed advanced nursing education program shall submit, an initial application at least 60 days before a scheduled board meeting, an initial application,. <u>The application</u> which shall include all of the following:

- (1) The course of study and credential to be conferred;
- (2) the name and title of the nurse administrator of the advanced nursing education program;
- (3) the name of the controlling body;

(4) the name and title of the administrator for of the controlling body;

(5) the organizational chart;

(6) all sources of financial support, including a three-year budget;

(7) a proposed curriculum, indicating the total number of hours of both theoretical and clinical instruction;

(8) the program objectives or outcomes;

- (9) the number, qualifications, and assignments of faculty members;
- (10) the faculty policies;

(11) the admission requirements;

(12) a copy of the current school bulletin or catalog;

(13) a description of clinical facilities and client census data;

(14) <u>each</u> contractual agreements by affiliating agencies for clinical facilities agreement, which shall be signed at least three months before the first date on which students may enroll. Each hospital and agency serving as an affiliating agency providing facilities for clinical experience shall be licensed or accredited by the appropriate credentialing groups;

(15) the program evaluation plan; and

(16) a proposed date of initial admission of students to the advanced nursing program.

(d) Each advanced nursing education program shall be surveyed for approval by the board have a site visit to validate information submitted in the program's application before granting approval, with the exception of nurse anesthesia programs, as determined by K.A.R. 60-13-103.

(1) During a survey each site visit, the nurse administrator of the program shall make available all of the following:

(A) Administrators, prospective faculty and students, affiliating agencies, representatives, preceptors, and support services personnel to discuss the advanced nursing education program;

(B) minutes of faculty meetings meeting minutes;

- (C) faculty and student handbooks;
- (D) policies and procedures;
- (E) curriculum materials;
- (F) a copy of the advanced nursing education program's budget; and
- (G) affiliating agency contractual agreements.

(2) The nurse administrator of the advanced nursing education program or designated personnel shall take the survey site visit team to inspect the nursing educational facilities, including satellite program facilities and library facilities.

(3) Upon completion of the survey site visit, the nurse administrator shall be asked to correct any inaccurate statements contained in the survey site visit report, limiting these comments to errors, unclear statements, or omissions.

(e) Each institution contemplating the establishment of <u>wanting to establish</u> an advanced nursing education program shall be surveyed <u>have a site visit</u> and accredited <u>be approved</u> by the board before the admission of <u>any</u> students.

(f) If an advanced nursing education program fails to meet the requirements of the board within a designated period of time, the <u>advanced nursing</u> program shall be notified by the board's designee of the board's intent to deny approval. 60-17-103. Reapproval requirements. (a) Based on the annual report required by K.A.R. 60-17-109, each advanced nursing education program shall be reviewed for reapproval by the board every two years.

(b) Each advanced nursing education program shall be resurveyed have a survey or site visit every five to 10 years.

(1) A survey or site visit may be conducted if there is consistent evidence indicating deficiencies any deficiency in meeting requirements.

(2) A survey or site visit of each nurse anesthesia program shall be conducted as required by K.A.R. 60-13-103-(d)(4).

(3) If the <u>advanced nursing</u> program is accredited by a national nursing accreditation agency, the resurvey <u>survey or site</u> visit may be made in coordination with a national nursing accreditation agency visit. Each <u>advanced nursing</u> program without national nursing accreditation shall be resurveyed <u>have a survey or site visit</u> every five years.

(c) The nurse administrator of each advanced nursing education program shall make available all of the following information during a survey or site visit:

(1) Data about the advanced nursing program, including the following:

(A) The number of students;

(B) the legal body responsible for establishing <u>advanced nursing</u> program policies and for support of the program;

(C) an organizational chart; and

(D) a description of the budgetary process;

(2) a description of the nurse administrator's responsibilities;

(3) information about the faculty and preceptors, including the following:

(A) A description of the responsibilities of each position;

(B) the selection policies;

- (C) the orientation plan;
- (D) faculty organization by-laws; and
- (E) the number of full-time and part-time faculty and nonnursing faculty with academic credentials and

assignments;

- (4) the faculty degree plan, if applicable;
- (5) a copy of the current curriculum with the date of last revision;
- (6) a description of education facilities, including classrooms, offices, library, and computers;
- (7) a list of clinical facilities;
- (8) the number of students enrolled; and
- (9) policies for students as listed in K.A.R. 60-2-107 60-17-108.
- (d) During a survey or site visit, the nurse administrator of the advanced nursing education program shall

make available all of the following:

- (1) Educational institution administrators, faculty, support services personnel, preceptors, and students;
- (2) staff at selected clinical facilities;
- (3) faculty meeting minutes for at least the previous three years;
- (4) faculty and student handbooks;
- (5) student records;
- (6) policies and procedures;
- (7) curriculum materials;
- (8) a copy of the advanced nursing education program's budget; and
- (9) affiliating agency contractual agreements-;

(10) an audited fiscal report covering the previous two years, including a statement of income and expenditures; and

(11) the testing process, with test analysis and the written test procedure.

(e) The nurse administrator of the advanced nursing education program or designated personnel shall take the survey or site visit team to the nursing educational facilities, including satellite program facilities, library facilities, and affiliating or clinical facilities.

(f) Upon completion of the survey <u>or site visit</u>, the nurse administrator shall correct any inaccurate statements contained in the survey <u>or site visit</u> report, limiting these comments to errors, unclear statements, or omissions.

(g) If an advanced nursing education program fails to meet requirements of the board within a designated period of time, the <u>advanced nursing</u> program shall be notified by the board's designee of the board's intent to deny reapproval. This notification shall be made pursuant to K.S.A. 77-512, and amendments thereto, and shall inform the program of its right to a hearing pursuant to the Kansas administrative procedures act. (Authorized by and K.S.A. 2017 Supp. 74-1106; implementing K.S.A. 2017 Supp. 65-1133; effective March 31, 2000; amended April 20, 2007; amended P-______)

60-17-104. <u>Administrator, f</u> Faculty and preceptor qualifications. (a) Each nurse faculty member shall be licensed as a registered professional nurse in Kansas.

(b) Each preceptor shall be licensed in the state in which the preceptor is currently practicing. Each preceptor shall complete a preceptor orientation that includes information about the pedagogical aspects of the student-preceptor relationship <u>and course information</u>.

(c) For advanced nursing education programs in the role of nurse anesthesia, each nurse faculty member shall have the following academic preparation and experience:

(1) The <u>dedicated nurse administrator who is responsible for the development and implementation of the</u> advanced nursing <u>education</u> program shall have had <u>successful</u> experience in administration or teaching and shall have a graduate degree <u>in nursing</u>. <u>The program administrator shall have sufficient administrative time and</u> <u>support to achieve and maintain positive program/student outcomes</u>.

(2) Each nurse faculty member who is assigned the responsibility of a course shall hold a graduate degree in <u>nursing</u>.

(3) Each nurse faculty member responsible for clinical instruction shall possess a license as an advanced practice registered nurse and a graduate degree in nursing.

(d) For advanced nursing education programs in any role other than nurse anesthesia, each nurse faculty member shall have the following academic preparation and experience:

(1) The nurse administrator who is responsible for the development and implementation of the advanced nursing education program shall have had experience in administration or teaching and shall have a graduate degree in nursing.

(2) Each nurse faculty member who is assigned the responsibility of a course shall hold a graduate degree. Each person who is hired as a nurse faculty member shall have a graduate degree in nursing, except for any person whose graduate degree was conferred before July 1, 2005. (3) Each nurse faculty member responsible for coordinating clinical instruction shall possess a license as an advanced practice registered nurse in the role for which clinical instruction is provided and shall have a graduate degree. Each person who is hired as a nurse faculty member shall have a graduate degree in nursing, except for any person whose graduate degree was conferred before July 1, 2005.

(4) Each preceptor or adjunct faculty <u>member</u> shall be licensed as an advanced practice registered nurse or shall be licensed as a physician in the state in which the individual is currently practicing. Each preceptor shall complete a preceptor orientation including information about the pedagogical aspects of the student-preceptor relationship.

(e) The nonnursing faculty of each advanced nursing education program shall have graduate degrees in the area of expertise.

60-17-105. Curriculum requirements. (a) The faculty in each advanced nursing education program shall fulfill these requirements:

(1) Identify the competencies of the graduate for each role of advanced nursing practice for which the <u>advanced nursing</u> program provides instruction;

(2) determine the approach and content for learning experiences;

(3) direct clinical instruction as an integral part of the advanced nursing program; and

(4) provide for learning experiences of the depth and scope needed to fulfill the objectives or outcomes of advanced nursing courses.

(b) The curriculum in each advanced nursing education program shall include all of the following:

(1) Role alignment related to the distinction between practice as a registered professional nurse and the advanced role of an advanced practice registered nurse as specified in K.A.R. 60-11-101;

(2) theoretical instruction in the role or roles of advanced nursing practice for which the program provides instruction;

(3) the health care delivery system;

(4) the ethical and legal implications of advanced nursing practice;

(5) three college semester credit hours or the academic equivalent hours in advanced pharmacology or the equivalent;

(6) three college semester credit hours or the academic equivalent hours in advanced pathophysiology or its equivalent and three college semester credit hours or the academic equivalent hours in advanced health assessment or its equivalent for licensure as an advanced practice registered nurse in a role other than nurse anesthesia and nurse midwifery;

(7) if completing an for any advanced practice registered nurse <u>nursing</u> program <u>completed</u> after July 1,
 2009, three college <u>semester credit hours or the academic equivalent</u> hours in advanced pathophysiology or its

equivalent and three college semester credit hours or the academic equivalent hours in advanced health assessment or its equivalent; and

(8) clinical instruction in the area of specialization, which shall include the following:

(A) Performance of or ordering diagnostic procedures;

(B) evaluation of diagnostic and assessment findings; and

(C) the prescription of medications and other treatment modalities for client conditions.

(c)(1) Each <u>advanced nursing</u> program shall consist of at least 45 semester credit hours or the academic equivalent. As used in this regulation, "academic equivalent" shall mean the prorated proportionate credit for formal academic coursework if that coursework is completed on the basis of trimester or quarter hours rather than semester hours.

(2) The clinical component shall consist of at least 260 <u>practice</u> hours of clinical learning. After January 1, 2003, the clinical component shall consist of at least 500 <u>practice</u> hours of clinical learning. After July 1, 2009, the clinical component shall consist of at least 500 <u>practice</u> hours of clinical learning in each clinical track, or the <u>advanced nursing</u> program shall provide documentation of the overlap if any clinical track consists of less than 500 <u>clinical practice</u> hours.

(d) Each nurse administrator shall meet the following requirements:

(1) Develop and implement a written plan-for program evaluation plan; and

(2) submit any major revision to the curriculum of advanced nursing courses for board approval at least 30 days before a meeting of the board. The following shall be considered major revisions to the curriculum:

(A) Any significant change in the plan of curriculum organization; and

(B) any change in content.

(e) Each nurse administrator shall submit all revisions that are not major revisions, as defined in paragraph

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60-17-106. Clinical resources. (a) Each advanced nursing education program shall have appropriate written contractual agreements with each affiliating agency. Each signed contract <u>contractual agreement</u> shall be kept on file in the advanced nursing education program office.

(b) Clinical learning experiences and sites shall be selected to provide learning opportunities necessary to achieve the advanced nursing education program objectives or student learning outcomes.

(c) Faculty shall facilitate and evaluate student learning experiences in the clinical area.

(d) Preceptors shall be responsible for assessing performance in the clinical setting.

(e) The advanced nursing education program shall provide verification that each agency used for clinical instruction has clinical facilities that are adequate for the number of students served in terms of space, equipment, and other necessary resources, including an adequate number of patients or clients necessary to meet the program objectives or student learning outcomes.



Collaboration to Address Gaps and Improve Efficiencies

PHILADELPHIA — As U.S. health systems continue to struggle with a chronic nursing shortage, the National Council of State Boards of Nursing and CGFNS International, a global leader in international credentials evaluation to support health professional mobility, are expanding their collaboration to help expedite credentials verification while boosting fraud detection and ensuring patient safety.

The cooperative effort will focus on information-sharing between the two organizations and technology improvements aimed at creating efficiencies that will streamline credentials verification for nurses applying to work in a new jurisdiction. This comes as state nursing boards across the U.S. face growing pressure to accelerate verification processes and enable nursing staff vacancies to be filled more quickly.

Meanwhile, with growing numbers of foreign-trained nurses applying to work in the United States, the collaboration will also aim to improve efficiencies in verifying their qualifications and shorten approval times, while also improving the capabilities of verification systems to detect fraudulent activities. To further strengthen fraud protection and ensure patient safety, the two organizations will work to facilitate data-sharing between CGFNS' worldwide credentials verification systems and NCSBN's online tools that member boards use to share information about imposter and/or fraudulent nurses.

"Together, we want to vastly reduce the time-consuming manual processes that nursing schools, licensing authorities and nurses themselves must go through to gather and verify transcripts, examination scores, licenses and other information that is essential to ensuring that nurses are qualified to practice," said Peter Preziosi, President and CEO of CGFNS International.

"At a time when health systems are struggling to fill nursing staff vacancies, this collaboration will help expand the flow of qualified nurses to where they are needed by making verification systems more efficient, while hardening them against fraud," he added.

"Our members, the state nursing boards, face the enormous challenge of shortening the time it takes to access the necessary information needed to gain licensure, while also ensuring the integrity of the health workforce and patient safety. The steps we are taking to interface our systems with CGFNS will help us achieve both of those goals," said David Benton, Chief Executive Officer of the NCBSN.

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2022 Kansas Statutes

65-1119. Schools of nursing; approval; approval of providers of continuing education offerings; application fee; criteria for evaluating out-of-state schools; nationally accredited schools of nursing. (a) Application for approval. An approved school of nursing is one which has been approved as such by the board as meeting the standards of this act. and the rules and regulations of the board. An institution desiring to conduct an approved school of professional or practical nursing shall apply to the board for approval and submit satisfactory proof that it is prepared to and will maintain the standards and basic professional nursing curriculum or the required curriculum for practical nursing, as the case may be, as prescribed by this act and by the rules and regulations of the board. Applications shall be made in writing on forms supplied by the board and shall be submitted to the board together with the application fee fixed by the board. The approval of a school of nursing shall not exceed 10 years after the granting of such approval by the board. An institution desiring to continue to conduct an approved school of professional or practical nursing shall apply to the board for the renewal of approval and submit satisfactory proof that it will maintain the standards and basic professional nursing curriculum or the required curriculum for practical nursing, as the case may be, as prescribed by this act and by the rules and regulations of the board. Applications for renewal of approval shall be made in writing on forms supplied by the board. Each school of nursing shall submit annually to the board an annual fee fixed by the board by rules and regulations to maintain the approval status.

(b) Schools for professional nurses. To qualify as an approved school for professional nurses, the school must be conducted in the state of Kansas, and shall apply to the board and submit evidence that: (1) It is prepared to carry out the professional curriculum as prescribed in the rules and regulations of the board; and (2) it is prepared to meet such other standards as shall be established by this law and the rules and regulations of the board.

(c) Schools for practical nurses. To qualify as an approved school for practical nurses, the school must be conducted in the state of Kansas, and shall apply to the board and submit evidence that: (1) It is prepared to carry out the curriculum as prescribed in the rules and regulations of the board; and (2) it is prepared to meet such other standards as shall be established by this law and the rules and regulations of the board.

(d) Survey. The board shall prepare and maintain a list of approved schools for both professional and practical nurses whose graduates, if they have the other necessary qualifications provided in this act, shall be eligible to apply for a license as a registered professional nurse or as a licensed practical nurse. A survey of the institution or institutions and of the schools applying for approval shall be made by an authorized employee of the board or members of the board, who shall submit a written report of the survey to the board. If, in the opinion of the board, the requirements as prescribed by the board in its rules and regulations for an approved school for professional nurses or for practical nurses are met, it shall so approve the school as either a school for professional nurses or practical nurses, as the case may be. The board shall resurvey approved schools on a periodic basis as determined by rules and regulations. If the board determines that any approved school of nursing is not maintaining the standards required by this act and by rules and regulations prescribed by the board, notice thereof in writing, specifying the failures of such school, shall be given immediately to the school. A school which fails to correct such conditions to the satisfaction of the board within a reasonable time shall be removed from the list of approved schools of nursing until such time as the school shall comply with the standards. All approved schools shall maintain accurate and current records showing in full the theoretical and practical courses given to each student. (e) Providers of continuing nursing education. (1) To qualify as an approved provider of continuing nursing education offerings, persons, organizations or institutions

proposing to provide such continuing nursing education offerings shall apply to the board for approval and submit evidence that the applicant is prepared to meet the standards and requirements established by the rules and regulations of the board for such continuing nursing education offerings. Initial applications shall be made in writing on forms supplied by the board and shall be submitted to the board together with the application fee fixed by the board.

(2) A long-term provider means a person, organization or institution that is responsible for the development, administration and evaluation of continuing nursing education programs and offerings. Qualification as a long-term approved provider of continuing nursing education offerings shall expire five years after the granting of such approval by the board. An approved long-term provider of continuing nursing education offerings shall submit annually to the board the annual fee established by rules and regulations, along with an annual report for the previous fiscal year. Applications for renewal as an approved long-term provider of continuing nursing education offerings shall be made in writing on forms supplied by the board.
(3) Qualification as an approved provider of a single continuing nursing education

offering, which may be offered once or multiple times, shall expire two years after the granting of such approval by the board. Approved single continuing nursing education providers shall not be subject to an annual fee or annual report.

(4) In accordance with rules and regulations adopted by the board, the board may approve individual educational offerings for continuing nursing education which shall not be subject to approval under other subsections of this section.

(5) The board shall accept offerings as approved continuing nursing education presented by: Colleges that are approved by a state or the national department of education and providers approved by other state boards of nursing, the national league for nursing, the national federation of licensed practical nurses, the American nurses credentialing center or other such national organizations as listed in rules and regulations adopted by the board.

(6) An individual designated by a provider of continuing nursing education offerings as an individual responsible for CNE who has held this position for the provider at least five years immediately prior to January 1, 1997, shall not be required to have a baccalaureate or higher academic degree in order to be designated by such provider as the individual responsible for CNE.

(f) Criteria for evaluating out-of-state schools. For the purpose of determining whether an applicant for licensure who is a graduate of a school of professional or practical nursing located outside this state meets the requirements of item (2) of subsection (a) of K.S.A. 65-1115 and amendments thereto or the requirements of item (2) of subsection (a) of K.S.A. 65-1116 and amendments thereto, as appropriate, the board by rules and regulations shall establish criteria for determining whether a particular school of professional nursing located outside this state maintains standards which are at least equal to schools of professional nursing which are approved by the board and whether a particular school of practical nursing located outside this state maintains standards which are at least equal to schools of practical nursing which are approved by the board. The board may send a questionnaire developed by the board to any school of professional or practical nursing located outside this state for which the board does not have sufficient information to determine whether the school meets the standards established under this subsection (f). The questionnaire providing the necessary information shall be completed and returned to the board in order for the school to be considered for approval. The board may contract with investigative agencies, commissions or consultants to assist the board in obtaining information about schools. In entering such contracts the authority to approve schools shall remain solely with the board.

(g) The board may accept nationally accredited schools of nursing as defined in rule and regulation.

(1) Schools of nursing which have received accreditation from a board recognized national nursing accreditation agency shall file evidence of initial accreditation with the board and shall file all reports from the accrediting agency and any notice of any change in school accreditation status. The board may grant approval based upon evidence of such accreditation.

(2) Schools of nursing holding approval based upon national accreditation are also responsible for complying with all other requirements as determined by rules and regulations of the board.

(3) The board may grant approval to a school of nursing with national accreditation

for a continuing period not to exceed 10 years. 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65-1133. Same; educational and training programs for advanced practice registered nurses; approval; survey; nationally accredited programs. (a) An approved educational and training program for advanced practice registered nurses is a program conducted in Kansas which has been approved by the board as meeting the standards and the rules and regulations of the board. An institution desiring to conduct an educational and training program for advanced practice registered nurses shall apply to the board for approval and submit satisfactory proof that it is prepared to and will maintain the standards and the required curriculum for advanced practice registered nurses as prescribed by this act and by the rules and regulations of the board. Applications shall be made in writing on forms supplied by the board and shall be submitted to the board together with the application fee fixed by the board. The approval of an educational program for advanced practice registered nurses shall not exceed 10 years after the granting of such approval by the board. An institution desiring to continue to conduct an approved educational program for advanced practice registered nurses shall apply to the board for the renewal of approval and submit satisfactory proof that it will maintain the standards and the required curriculum for advanced practice registered nurses as prescribed by this act and by the rules and regulations of the board. Applications for renewal of approval shall be made in writing on forms supplied by the board. Each program shall submit annually to the board an annual fee fixed by the board's rules and regulations to maintain the approved status. (b) A program to qualify as an approved educational program for advanced practice registered nurses must be conducted in the state of Kansas, and the school conducting the program must apply to the board and submit evidence that: (1) It is prepared to carry out the curriculum prescribed by rules and regulations of the board; and (2) it is prepared to meet such other standards as shall be established by law and the rules and regulations of the board.

(c) The board shall prepare and maintain a list of programs which qualify as approved educational programs for advanced practice registered nurses whose graduates, if they have the other necessary qualifications provided in this act, shall be eligible to apply for licensure as advanced practice registered nurses. A survey of the institution or school applying for approval of an educational program for advanced practice registered nurses shall be made by an authorized employee of the board or members of the board, who shall submit a written report of the survey to the board. If, in the opinion of the board, the requirements as prescribed by the board in its rules and regulations for approval are met, it shall so approve the program. The board shall resurvey approved programs on a periodic basis as determined by rules and regulations. If the board determines that any approved program is not maintaining the standards required by this act and by rules and regulations prescribed by the board, notice thereof in writing, specifying the failures of such program, shall be given. A program which fails to correct such conditions to the satisfaction of the board within a reasonable time shall be removed from the list of approved programs until such time as the program shall comply with such standards. All approved programs shall maintain accurate and current records showing in full the theoretical and practical courses given to each student.

(d) The board may accept nationally accredited advanced practice registered nurse programs as defined by rules [and] regulations adopted by the board in accordance with K.S.A. 65-1130, and amendments thereto:

 Advanced practice registered nurse programs which have received accreditation from a board recognized national nursing accreditation agency shall file evidence of initial accreditation with the board, and thereafter shall file all reports from the accreditation agency and any notice of any change in school accreditation status.
 Advanced practice registered nurse programs holding approval based upon national accreditation are also responsible for complying with all other requirements as determined by rules and regulations of the board.

(3) The board may grant approval to an advanced practice registered nurse program with national accreditation for a continuing period not to exceed 10 years.
